Course Description

This survey course of American literature is designed for students reading on grade level. It begins with the Colonial Period and moves through the Rise of Realism, the Civil War, the post war periods, and the 1900s to contemporary writings; units within the time periods are thematically arranged. Attention is given to major literary trends such as Puritanism, Naturalism, Regionalism, Transcendentalism, Modernism, and Contemporary literature as well as to major American authors and significant historical periods. Literary forms covered include short stories, novels, poetry, dramas, and nonfiction pieces. Students are given the opportunity to improve grammar and usage skills. Emphasis is placed on the development of critical and analytical thinking skills through classroom discussion and compositions. The completion of a research project is required during the term. At least three outside readings and the study of vocabulary are required in this course. Students are asked to think and to write critically and analytically. They are asked to relate literary content to historical events, apply the use of literary terminology, and discuss basic concepts presented in the literature. The course will emphasize skills needed to improve and enhance performance on the SAT, the ACT, and the GA Milestones EOC in American Literature.

Late Assignment Policy:

Students will have 3 opportunities to submit **late homework** assignments.

Students who fail to submit their homework assignment(s) on the designated date by the individual instructor will receive a point deduction as follows out of a possible maximum of 100.

ELA TUTORIAL POLICY

The AMHS English Department requires that students sign up for tutorial spots in advance using the form on each teacher’s website. Classroom Rules, Expectations, and Procedures

Rules:

1. Follow directions/be prepared for class
2. Raise your hand to speak
3. Stay in your seat
4. Speak appropriately to adults and peers
 - a. No profanity.
 - b. Use only given name.
 - c. No name calling or teasing.
 - d. No verbal abuse or threats to anyone.
 - e. Never talk back to the teacher!
 - f. Speak Formal English while in class.
5. Behave Appropriately
 - a. Keep your hands and feet to yourself.
 - b. No flying objects.
 - c. No physical or verbal disruption.
6. Absolutely no bullying behavior is tolerated.
 - a. No physical, verbal, or electronic harassment of any kind.
 - b. No hurtful teasing, gossip or student forced isolation.
 - c. Everyone in this class has the right to feel safe
7. Absolutely **NO FOOD OR DRINKS**—only clear water will be permitted
8. Clear your desk before you leave—left trash/paper/personal items of any kind will result in an automatic 15 to 30 minute detention.

Consequences:

1. **Verbal Warning**—Name written on board (with possible seat change)
2. **Parent Contact**—Check by name, parent contact.
3. **Reflective Essay/Detention**—Two checks by name. You will receive an essay topic to be written and returned the next day during your class period.
4. **Teacher/Parent Conference**—I may choose to do this at any time and will keep in contact with parents throughout the school year.
5. **Administrative Action/Expulsion**—An office referral or immediate removal from the classroom
6. **Automatic 15 to 30-minute detention**—left trash/paper/personal items of any kind on your desk or surrounding area (floor, under the chair, table top, etc...)
7. **Pink/Blue Slips**—after the 3rd Pink/Blue Slip student will serve an automatic take home detention

Procedures:

A. Entering the classroom

When entering the classroom, you will need to find your seat quickly and begin working on the daily warm-up/bell ringer. Unless otherwise instructed, there is NO talking at this time. If you have a question about the warm-up, raise your hand and I will assist you. **Talking during this time for any reason will result in a consequence.**

B. Talking in Class

Talking will not be tolerated when the instructor or a student is speaking, or when the instructor has designated a time for silence. Immediate silence is also mandatory when an announcement comes over the intercom. If you need the instructor's attention, you must raise your hand instead of calling out, or you will not be recognized for your contribution and be warned instead. **A three finger countdown will signal when the instructor needs your attention. You will have three opportunities to become silent before a consequence is initiated.**

C. Active Listening

When an instructor, classmate, or guest is speaking, you will be silent with your eyes on that person. We will show you respect when you share your thoughts and opinions, and you should show that same respect to others. Throughout class, if you have a question, do not hesitate to ask it at the appropriate time. There is no such thing as a "stupid question" if you are genuinely confused, it is likely someone else has the same concern. Our open class atmosphere should embody that belief.

D. Trash

The classroom should never have paper or trash on the floor. Paper should **Not** be “thrown” into the trash can; it should be placed in a recycling container. Keep all trash in your possession unless it is an appropriate time to walk to the trash can (i.e., independent practice.) **The class will not leave until the room is clear of debris.**

E. Personal Grooming

The use of lotion, perfume, hair-brushing or any other sort of personal grooming is not acceptable in the classroom as it is distracting and inappropriate in a professional setting.

F. Bell-to-Bell Instruction

The bell is a signal for instructors to end their lesson. I will let you know when you are dismissed. Students must be in their seats with all trash picked up and materials returned to their proper spots. **Students will not leave until formally dismissed by the instructor.**

G. Substitutes

You will treat substitutes with the same respect that Arabia Mountain expects that you treat all of your instructors. Being a substitute is hard work!

H. Electronic Devices

Cell phones, iPods, etc, must be turned off and out of sight during class as a professional courtesy to your instructor and classmates. (Unless otherwise instructed for use during a lesson) If a device is seen or heard, it will be taken up until the end of the period/end of the day. If this is a reoccurring problem, the device will be held until a parent or guardian can retrieve it. Please do not ask if you may have these devices out.
